Offered in cooperation with the State of California Department of Justice, this program allows graduates to apply for the California Department of Justice credential, which designates them as a Certified Crime and Intelligence Analyst for the State of California.

Courses focus on the analysis of crimes which most frequently come to the attention of field and investigative officers, and those of interest to intelligence officers.

Participants in the program will learn how to:

- Analyze crime and use law enforcement data to forecast when and where criminals are likely to strike.
- Detect and understand distinctions among crime patterns.
- Use crime and intelligence information to create directed patrol or tactical action plans that lead to an effective response.
- Collect data, subject it to statistical tests, develop and test hypotheses, and write conclusions that adhere to commonly accepted criminal justice research standards.

CERTIFICATE IN CRIME AND INTELLIGENCE ANALYSIS

In just 16 weekends from September through July you can take the seven classes needed to become a Certified Crime and Intelligence Analyst for the State of California. When you have completed at least half of your classes, begin your 400-hour supervised Practicum* with the crime analysis unit of a law enforcement agency. After passing all of your classes (C or better) and finishing your Practicum, you will earn the Certificate in Crime and Intelligence Analysis, and be awarded the California Department of Justice credential.
